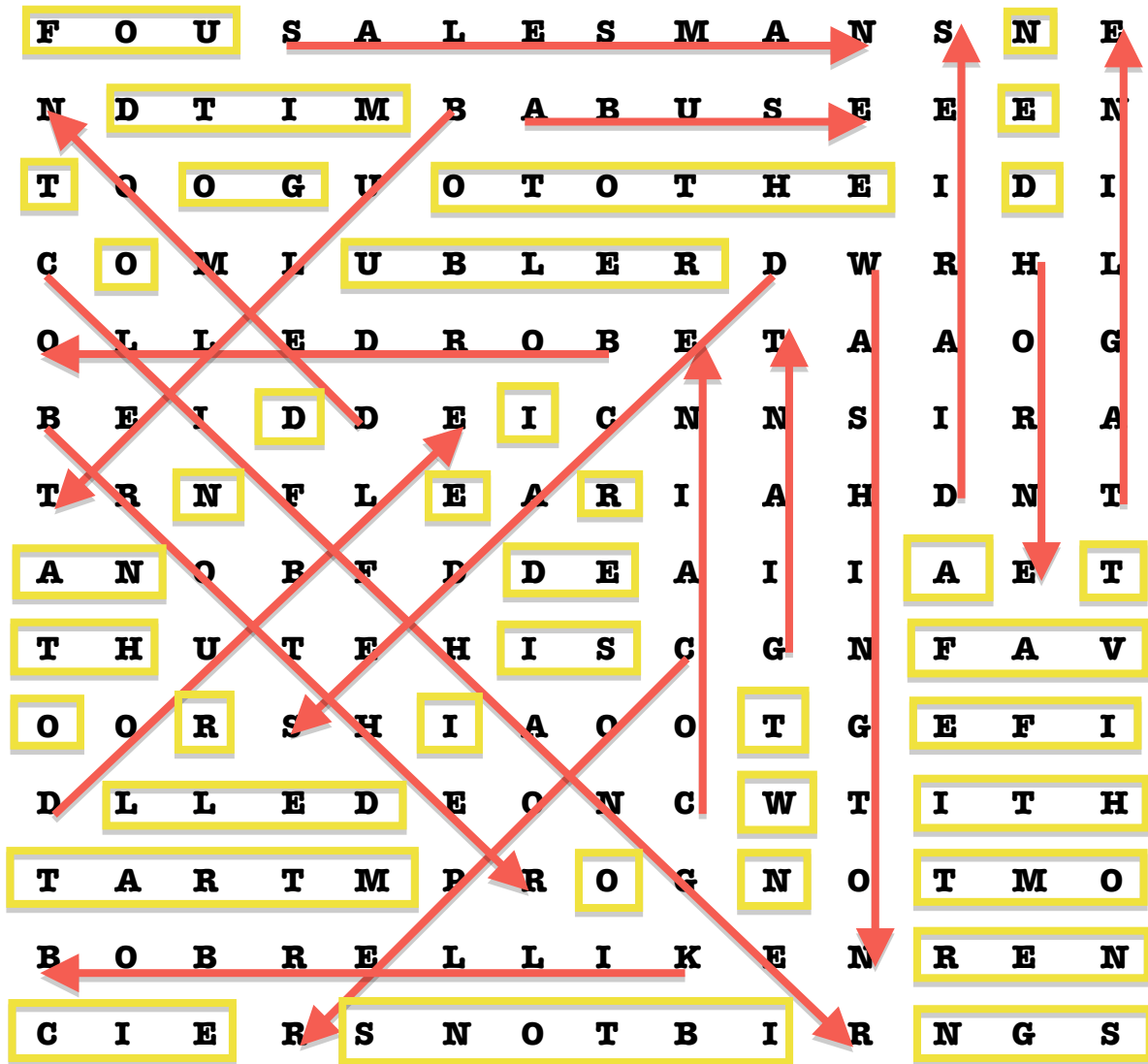

5. Jacques Renault provided this stimulating ex-Coca-Cola ingredient to Laura Palmer. COCAINE
6. Time for a dream sequence, in which a one-armed man reveals that the murderer is named for this—an orca's flapper haircut, maybe?
7. The dreamy one-armed man is found to be this traveling pitchman, best not left alone with farmer's daughters... SALESMAN
8. ...with ties to Laura's drug dealer, who is linked to this richest man in Twin Peaks, named after chanteuses Lena and Marilyn. HORNE
9. The richest man in Twin Peaks is also the owner of this place filled with johns (an anagram of "doorbell")... BORDELLO
