Additionally, you'll be able to see how your time ranks relative to other teams worldwide on our web site.

The Detective had a suspect in mind straight away: Leo the Leopard. A career cat burglar, he'd only just got out from doing time for a similar crime.




Diana reread the transcript. **Each line** must have held a clue to what Leo was actually doing that night. Leo's final statement rang in her ears:

Flies () stick to the lattice points of the grid






A Nest of Vipers

In the Reptile House Diana felt uneasy, the writhing mass of snakes she saw sparked a primeval fear inside her.


Some of these might be helpful witnesses, but which ones?

The primates had banded together by type, linking in chains that were tangled amongst each other.


As she examined closely she noticed some monkeys that were not part of the group, what they told her brought the investigation to a close.


Identify the lonely simians, eliminating the others, to find the reason why Diana stopped her investigation.
